Project Spotlight



As the pandemic wanes and Raleigh Little Theatre (RLT) prepares to reboot its programming, the arts organization is ensuring its staffing practices align with its diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) values. RLT came to Skills for Cities ready to focus on enhancing its recruitment and hiring guidelines to be more equitable.

A cross-company team of volunteer experts in human resources, business analysis, and process optimization assessed RLT's guidelines and performed a gap analysis, asking staff questions that challenged them to think critically about their barriers to recruiting diverse candidate pools. Through these conversations, the volunteers compiled DEI best practices and a checklist breaking down RLT's three overarching needs - attracting, evaluating, and onboarding talent - into key categories with recommendations sorted from most urgent to longer-term or back burner ideas.

This thoughtful deliverable is empowering RLT's small team to take on individual action items on its way toward achieving its DEI objectives.
